
PROMOTING Gender Equality

We are proud to represent
Jineth Bedoya Lima, a
Colombian journalist who was
kidnapped, threatened, and
sexually assaulted for her
reporting on human rights.

Her case at the Inter-American Court of Human Rights recognized sexual violence as a tool to silence female journalists, highlighting the urgent need to address the threats women in public roles, especially journalism, face. In implementing the reparations ordered by the Court, Colombia created the "It Is Not Time to Remain Silent" Fund, which has an annual budget of USD \$ 500,000 to support Colombian female journalists who are victims of genderbased violence.

The María da Penha case involved a Brazilian woman who survived two violent attacks by her husband.

With CEJIL's support, she brought her case to the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights, which issued a series of recommendations for reparations to María da Penha and advised the state to adopt measures against gender-based violence. This landmark case led to the Maria da Penha Law and inspired the Belem do Pará Convention, the only treaty on violence against women.

Defending the Defenders

cejil played a key role in holding Mexico accountable for Digna Ochoa's assassination, leading to reforms to protect human rights defenders.

We secured the release of eight arbitrarily detained
Guapinol environmental defenders in Honduras, a major victory for environmental justice and human rights.

In 2024, the Inter-American Court ruled in favor of CAJAR, holding Colombia accountable for 30 years of illegal surveillance of human rights defenders, securing reforms to Colombia's surveillance practices.

After 40 years of impunity for Gabriel Sales Pimenta's assassination, we took the case to the Inter-American Court, prompting institutional reforms to address violence against human rights defenders in Brazil.

Defending Defenders with Effective Public Policies

Threats against human rights defenders often signal imminent danger but are rarely properly investigated, leaving defenders, their families, and communities vulnerable.

In response, we gathered experts and over 30 organizations to create an International Protocol for Effectively Investigating Threats against Human Rights Defenders.

Human Rights in Climate Action Defending the Planet's Protectors

We advocate for environmental defenders and Indigenous communities, amplifying their voices and ensuring their protection. We promote interdisciplinary solutions that enhance climate adaptation, mitigation, and reparative efforts through a human rights lens.

Our work helped protect the territories of indigenous peoples like the Sarayaku in Ecuador, Yakye Axa in Paraguay, Miskito in Nicaragua and Honduras, and Yanomami in Venezuela.





We played a key role in Chile and Colombia's submission of an Advisory Opinion on the climate emergency to the Inter-American Court and launched human rights-based initiatives to address short-lived climate pollutants like methane.



Our work has led to the removal or blockage of amnesty laws in Peru, Guatemala, Uruguay, Brazil, and El Salvador, the prosecution of individuals for crimes against humanity, and the creation of numerous memorial sites.



Protecting Democratic Institutions

Judicial Independence and Freedom of Expression

We combat the misuse of the justice system to prevent the criminalization of defenders and protect judicial independence.

We have secured measures for:

+27 In Guatemala and Peru.

We safeguard freedom of expression as a cornerstone of democracy, defending journalists like:

- Carmen Aristegui in Mexico.
- Supporting digital media like El Faro in El Salvador.
- Promoting community radios like Radio Estrella del Mar in Chile.
- We continue protecting the right to peaceful protest across the continent.

Strong International Institutions



Our work seeks to strengthen international human rights protection systems to make them more accessible and effective in protecting and promoting human rights. The GQUAL campaign, a CEJIL-supported initiative, focuses on achieving gender parity in international justice. Since its launch in 2015, GQUAL has increased women's representation from:

32.5% **→** 44%

across 102 international institutions.

We focus on empowering others to access international spaces.

In 2023/2024, we strengthened over 50 organizations and equipped 120+ activists, including children and youth, with the tools to advocate for their rights in global forums.
